




MADISON COUNTY LOCATION MAP



AREA MAP




LOCATION MAP



We have reviewed the June 15, 2012, cultural resources survey report by James Lauro, Archaeologist, received on July 16, 2012, and the revised report, received August 16, 2012, for the above referenced undertaking, pursuant to our responsibilities under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act and 36 CFR Part 800. After reviewing the information provided, we concur that the proposed park will not affect the Doak's Stand site, #22Md563, as the site is outside the project area. We also concur that the four newly identified sites, 22Md796-799, and Isolated Find 1, are not eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. Therefore, no historic resources will be affected by the park. As such, we have no reservations with the project.

There remains the possibility that unrecorded cultural resources may be encountered during the project. Should this occur, we would appreciate your contacting this office immediately in order that we may offer appropriate comments under 36 CFR 800.13.

Comments should also be solicited from Tribes with an interest in Mississippi.

As part of Madison County's commitment to providing outdoor recreational opportunities, Madison County has developed a list of facilities that would meet the needs of both local and countywide residents. From this planning process, it was determined that after the lake was built, a non-motorized diverse use trail would be the first item constructed.

The Madison County Board of Supervisors hired Gary Haygood, Landscape Architect, to develop a master plan that would provide a guide for the development of the park. As part of this plan, a 10 ft wide and .75 miles non-motorized diverse use trail was determined to be the starting point for developing this facility.

Budgeting for the trail project was based on material cost from term bids and construction cost from other projects. It is the intent of Madison County to use in-house employees and equipment to construct the non-motorized diverse use trail. The County is equipped with heavy equipment and qualified staff to perform this work. The funding being requested will go towards material only.

2. Environmental Mitigation - Describe how the project will mitigate and minimize impact to the natural environment. Degree to which project aids in the restoration, enhancement, and conservation of natural resource in the area in which the project is located.

As with all projects, the County will provide a SWPPP that will outline all erosion control devices and methods. This will be provided by in-house engineers to ensure that all natural resources will not be affected by the development of this project. The County will install Best Management Practices (BMP's) that will include silt fences, construction entrance, "good housekeeping" area, silt basins, over-seeding and grassing of all disturbed areas affected by the construction.

Once completed, the County will plant native grasses and plant materials. These materials will enhance the use of the trail and will provide enhanced water quality measures. Once the facility is fully complete, it is our desire that local school groups use the facility to discuss, learn and experience the flora and fauna of this area. Through water quality projects, tree planting programs and other educational opportunities, Madison County will be able to provide an opportunity that will educate individuals and enhance the environment.

3. Connections/Linkages - Describe how the proposed project provides viable connections or linkages to other trails, greenways, scenic corridors, natural, cultural and recreational resources, or community activities. If the project is connected to a larger trail system, describe the size, extent, and predominant uses of that system.

Once the Sulphur Springs Park is fully developed, this trail will provide access to different ecosystems, playgrounds, tennis courts, multipurpose fields, multipurpose piers and a future public community center. Additionally, the proposed trail will have multiple routes available that will provide different lengths, difficulty and views.

4. Trail Corridor Sharing - Describe how the trail project can accommodate a variety of motorized and/or non-motorized trail activities (equestrian, hiking, mountain biking, ATV, motorcycle, etc.)

Visitors to Sulphur Springs, wishing to use the non-motorized diverse use trail, will be allowed to walk, hike, jog, ride bikes, and skateboard along the trail. The non-motorized diverse use trail, which will have multiple routes, has an elevation change that will provide multiple levels of difficulty to allow for specialized activities. In addition to physical activity, visitors to the trail will have an opportunity to view different areas of flora and fauna that can be used for both interpretive and environmental educational opportunities. Local schools will be able to use this facility to educate their students and provide outdoor educational opportunities that cannot be achieved in the classroom. By providing a trail that's 10 feet wide, the trail system will easly accommodate multiple users, including those with disabilities. By not limiting the trail design to a single use, the trail will provide users with different interest the opportunity to enjoy the facility.

Equestrian and motorized vehicles, other than electric wheelchairs, will not be allowed to be used on the trail system.

5. Trail Commitment – Describe the long-term commitment (ex. 20, 30, 50 year recreational easement or limitation of use) that the trail sponsor *will* implement / use, if selected for funding. Degree of commitment for continued project maintenance and operation to insure that the trail will remain open and operable for the intent for which funds are being asked.

Madison County, having already invested a considerable amount of funding towards Sulphur Springs Park, is committed not only to this park but to all parks that are under the Madison County umbrella. The ability to offer outdoor recreational opportunities to our citizens is an important part of Madison County's long term plan of continuing to provide the best quality of life possible. The Madison County Building and Grounds Department will provide maintenace and it's budget will be adjusted as facilities are increased.

Bonus Points - Will trail project be of national, statewide or regional significance or unique? Explain.

The trail, once funded by the Recreational Trails Program, will be a "Regional" trail that will provide recreational opportunities to Madison County and adjacent counties. Yazoo, Holmes, Attala, Leake, Scott, and Rankin Counties are all in close proximity to this location and would have access to these amenities.
