Chief Williams,

As per our phone conversation today, please accept this as Maverick Film's written request for the assistance of the Madison County Sheriff's Department during the upcoming filming of our motion picture "The Man Across the Street."

This independent production is supported by the Mississippi Film Incentive Program and has been vetted by the Film Office, a division of the Mississippi Development Authority, and will provide the county with a certificate of insurance. Filming begins June 28th, ends on July 12th, and will be shot entirely in Madison, Rankin and Hinds Counties.

On June 29th we'll be shooting a car crash scene on a Madison County road or street - location to be determined - and, while the two vehicles will *not* actually hit one another, we would need one or two deputies on-site for safety. This activity is estimated to take two hours, and will be filmed at night.

On June 30th, we will be filming in Lost Rabbit, and we are hoping we might have a patrol vehicle (or two) parked on Louisiana Street, as part of the scene we'll be filming at a home there. Neither vehicle will move during the filming, and their identifying graphics need not be seen if that's the department's wish. This, too, will be shot after dark, and take approximately two hours.

Having personally worked with Mark Sandridge on previous movies, I'm requesting his presence, if possible, since he has some familiarity with motion picture production, and has always been a very helpful, professional representative of your department.
